### Lawn and Garden - Lynn Loughary, Agent

Spring is a perfect time to take a soil sample from your yard or garden to determine your soil's pH, phosphorus, and potassium levels. This information is critical in amending the soil correctly and in determining the best fertilizer for your plants. Soil tests detect shortages of major plant nutrients which affect growth and development of plants. The test doesn't identify or measure insects, soil borne diseases, pesticide residues, or other contaminants.

You will need to take several subsamples (at least 6) from the area being tested. Mix those together and pull out 1 cup of soil and place in a Ziplock bag with the area identified on the bag. Bring that soil sample to the Extension office for processing. There is a small processing fee that can be paid online. Soil test information can be found on our <u>county extension website!</u>

### Family and Consumer Sciences, Health and Nutrition - Lori Wuellner, Agent

State Specialist, Sandy Procter, shared in a training this month the current view on introducing peanut products into children's diet based on the LEAP (Learning Early About Peanut Allergy).

The science and research-based advice agree that there is a window of time in a baby's development, during a time when solid foods are being first offered, when the introduction of potentially allergenic foods, like peanut-based foods, is safest. Recommendations are based on children considered highest risk, mild to moderate risk and those without risks. In all cases always consult with your doctor before implementation.
