Project Enrollment Deadline: May 1st

Can you believe it's already April? : That means May 1st is just around the corner!

May 1st is the last day to enroll 4-H members in their projects on 4-H Online for the 24-25 year. Most of the 4-H divisions at the county fair require 4-H members to be enrolled in the corresponding project area. Log on to your 4-H Online account to make sure your 4-Her is enrolled in all of their project areas by **May 1st**!

Animal ID Forms for County Fair: Due May 1st

May 1st is also the deadline for livestock ID forms!

Livestock ID forms are due to the 4-H Agent by **May 1st** for horses, leased rabbits, and all non-market/breeding livestock (goats, sheep, swine, and cattle).

Livestock ID forms have the same role as a Kansas 4-H tag. It identifies the animal as a 4-H project and establishes your ownership of that 4-H project animal. Your animal must have an ID form or a Kansas 4-H tag in order to show in the 4-H divisions at the county fair.

YQCA Certifications: Due June 15th

An annual YQCA certification is required for all 4-Hers showing any livestock animal in the 4-H divisions at the Wyandotte County Fair. Livestock animals include all cattle (dairy and beef), swine, goats (dairy and meat), sheep, horses, poultry, and rabbits. Cloverbuds (5-7 year olds) are exempt from the YQCA certification requirment.

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multi-species youth livestock quality assurance program that focuses on food safety, animal well-being, and character development, through age-appropriate educational curriculum for youth 8-21 years of age. This program is an annual certification that grows with a young person, so the learning modules are different every year. YQCA certification is good for one year and must be completed annually.

4-H members showing a livestock animal must submit their annual YQCA certification to the 4-H Agent by June 15, 2025.



Go to yqcaprogram.org to complete the course online. The course is designed to give 60 minutes of instruction. There are also in-person certification options available through out the state.

Non-Market/Breeding Livestock ID Form Information

Non-market/breeding animals are 4-H livestock projects that are shown at the fair in the breeding classes. These animals are typically kept for breeding purposes and are not shown in the 4-H market (meat) classes or sold at auction. Animals used for breeding usually have registration papers, tattoos, USDA premise ID tags, or other forms of permanent identification. Non-Market/breeding 4-H projects are typically not tagged in every year like market animals. Kansas 4-H Policy states that 4-H members/families must own the animal that is being exhibited in the 4-H divisions. Just like the Kansas 4-H EID tags serve as "proof of ownership" for market animals, the 4-H Project ID forms serve as "proof of ownership" for 4-H livestock projects that are not tagged-in. Below is information about each ID form and which animals need to have a form submitted to the 4-H Agent. If you have any questions about whether or not you need to submit an ID form for your animal, please reach out to your club leader or 4-H Agent. The Non-Market/Breeding Livestock ID forms need to be emailed to the 4-H Agent on or before May 1st. ***The Kansas State Fair and KJLS may require EID tags, DNA samples, or additional paperwork to show a breeding animal. It is the 4-H family's responsibility to check the requirements for KSF and KJLS!!!***

The due date for breeding/non-market ID forms for all species is May 1, annually. Livestock that are born after May 1 can still be shown by 4-H members. Please contact the 4-H Agent for an edited ID form for these animals.

For cattle, swine, sheep and goat forms- Previously the project leader was required to sign the form. Now club or project leaders can sign the updated form. Signatures from both are not needed. **A color photo of the animal is required for each ID form.**

Heifer & Cow ID Form- This ID form is for heifers and cows that are going to be shown in the 4-H breeding beef classes. This form is not for market heifers that will be shown in the market class.

Swine ID Form- This ID form is for swine that are going to be shown in the 4-H breeding swine classes. This form is not for market or prospect hogs.

Sheep ID Form- This ID form is for sheep showing in the 4-H breeding ewe classes. This form is not for market lambs. All sexually intact ewes must be identified with an official USDA premise ID tag (scrapies tag). Forms without a scrapies tag number will be rejected. 4-Hers wanting to show lambs born after the ID form deadline of May 1 should contact the 4-H Agent.

Goat ID Form- This ID form is for bucks and does that will be shown in the 4-H breeding doe or buck classes. This form is not for market/meat goats. All sexually intact does and bucks must be identified with a registered tattoo or an official USDA premise ID tag (scrapies tag). Forms without a tattoo or scrapies tag number will be rejected. 4-Hers wanting to show kids born after the ID form deadline of May 1 should contact the 4-H Agent.

Horse ID forms- This is a new K-State ID form that was updated in July 2024. All previous horse ID forms cannot be used. Photos of horses must be in color, show all four feet, and may not be wearing any tack other than a halter/bridle. 4-Hers showing their horse at the Kansas State Fair MUST have a horse ID form with the 4-H Agent's original signature at check in.

Leased Rabbit ID Form- This is a new form for this year. All leased rabbits must be approved by the Rabbit Project Leader, Renee Foster. She can be contacted at mrsrfoster7@gmail.com. Leased rabbits are not eligible to be shown at the Kansas State Fair or sold at auction.



Ignite Your SPARK: Exploring 4-H projects

Horticulture and Landscape Design

In this project, 4-H members learn when, where and what to plant. Learn the difference between cool and warm-season vegetables; learn plant parts and how they are used; learn how to use basic garden tools; study seed varieties and starting seeds indoors; study preventative pest controls; learn about specialty harvests and selling your produce; study plant pollinations; study food industry careers; and learn about biotechnology.

- This project is great for any 4-Her wanting to learn about gardening, floriculture, flower arrangements, and growing vegetables and crops.
- 4-Hers can enter projects in the county fair by entering vegetables, cut flowers, fresh herbs, fresh or dried flower arrangements, or garden displays. There are no limit to the number of entries a 4-Her can make in this division, as long as each entry is unique. For example- A 4-Her can enter multiple times in the medium size vegetable class, but each entry must be of a different vegetable (a plate of cucumbers, a plate of tomatoes, a plate of beets, etc.)
- The Kansas State Fair offers a 4-H Horticulture and Landscape Design division.
- Kansas 4-H also offered an annual Horticulture Judging Contest each August. For more info on the Horticulture Judging Contest visit the <u>K-State Horticulture Judging website</u>.











Shopping in Style



4-H members will learn what clothing styles look best on them while they also gain skills in building a versatile wardrobe and staying within their budget. IPM Insect Art Contest

The K-State Research and Extension Pesticide Safety and IPM Program is hosting its annual insect-themed art contest, open to all ages and skill levels in Kansas! This year, the theme is "By the Light of the Moon: Insects at Night."

The goal is to explore why and how insects are active or inactive at night, then create artwork that fits the contest theme. Art may be a drawing or painting, digital art, or a 3-D piece such as sculpture, stained glass or other media.

There are five age categories in which 1st - 3rd place will be awarded:

- Kindergarten 2nd grade
- 3rd grade 5th grade
- 6th grade 8th grade
- High school
- Adult

Entries must be received or postmarked before April 15, 2025.

Resources for Beef, Meat Goat, Sheep, and Swine Projects

Check out the <u>Clover Classroom</u> for project challenges for all of your 4-H projects. In particular, find the <u>Ruminant Challenge</u> for an activity to learn about how your specie's digestive system works. Check back later in the spring as the Animal Science Project Partnership Team is in the process of creating additional Project Challenges.


The <u>Kansas 4-H Animal Science Webinar series</u> contains recordings of previous Animal Science webinars. You will find timely topics from professionals to inform and educate you about caring for your project. Check back as this will begin to be updated this spring.

<u>Kansas State University's Youth Livestock Program</u> page contains information to educate as well as inform you about ownership and entering state livestock shows (Kansas State Fair Grand Drive and Kansas Junior Livestock Show). KSU's Youth Livestock Program is the administrator for the livestock nomination (ownership) process for the Kansas State Fair Grand Drive and the Kansas Junior Livestock Show. Guidance for the nomination process is available here (https://www.asi.k-state.edu/extension/youth-programs/nominated-livestock/).

You will also find information about KSU's annual Junior Producer Days on the KSU Youth Livestock site. Junior Producer Days is an opportunity for youth (and parents) to learn about the basics of their project, get hands-on experience and expand beyond basic daily care. Two producer days are held annually in the spring. During even years, attend Junior Beef Producer Day or Junior Sheep Producer Day. During odd years, attend Junior Meat Goat Producer Day or Junior Swine Producer Day. Previous years' Producer Days materials are available as well.

If you're interested in taking your livestock project to the next level and participating in a state show, your options are the <u>Kansas State Fair Grand Drive</u> and the <u>Kansas Junior Livestock Show</u>. Pay careful attention to nomination and entry deadlines. You will need to begin as early as April to order DNA kits and start the nomination process. The KSU Youth Livestock Program houses all nomination information for state shows (https://www.asi.k-state.edu/extension/youth-programs/nominated-livestock/).

Consider participating in Livestock Judging, Meat Judging, Quiz Bowl or Skillathon contests. Regional contests are held in various areas of the state as well as the state Livestock Sweepstakes, which is held annually on KSU's campus.
