New 4-H Year Starts October 1st

The 2025-2026 4-H year starts next month on **October 1**st. On or after **October 1**st, all 4-H members, cloverbuds, club leaders, project leaders, and adult volunteers need to re-enroll in 4-H Online.com. 4-H members will need to pay the annual membership fee of \$15. Cloverbuds and adult leaders/volunteers do not pay an annual membership fee.

Payment of Annual 4-H Membership Fees

When enrolling on 4-H Online, you will be given the option of paying immediately with a credit card or mailing a check to the state 4-H office. If you choose to mail a check, you are responsible for following up with the state office to ensure they received your check and processed your payment. The county 4-H Agent does not have control over the annual membership fee payment process.

November 30 Re-Enrollment Policy

All returning 4-H members who participated in the 2025 county fair and are planning to participate in the 2026 county fair are required to re-enroll in 4-H Online by November 30th. Don't delay!

New 4-H Club Meeting Attendance Rule

Starting October 1, 2025 all returning 4-H members must attend a minimum of five (5) club meetings between October 1st and July 1st of the current 4-H year in order to enter a project and/or exhibit in the 4-H divisions at the county and state fairs.

Rule example: Cara showed a beef project in the 4-H divisions at the 2025 county fair. Cara plans to show a beef project in the 4-H divisions at the 2026 county fair. With the new rule, Cara must attend 5 or more club meetings between October 1, 2025 and July 1, 2026 in order to enter and show her beef project in the county fair.

The way this rule will be enforced:

At every monthly club meeting the club secretary (or other youth officer) will do a roll call and record the names of the 4-H members in attendance. The club secretary is responsible for sending the roll call list to the 4-H Agent within 5 days of the meeting. The roll call can be sent to the 4-H Agent in any way that makes sense to the club secretary- whether that is via email, text, screen shot, word document, spreadsheet, etc. Emails must be sent to csling@ksu.edu and texts go to 913-299-9307.

When entering 4-H exhibits in FairEntry for the county fair, 4-Hers will be asked to enter the dates of the 5 or more club meetings they attended between October 1, 2025 and July 1, 2026. The club meeting dates entered in FairEntry must match the role calls dates the club secretary sent to the 4-H agent throughout the year. It is the responsibility of the 4-H family to keep track of the dates and number of meetings they attended. Returning 4-H members who do not attend 5 or more 4-H club meetings or who enter false information in FairEntry will not be allowed to exhibit in the 4-H divisions at the county and state fairs.

4-H clubs that are required to send roll call lists after each club meeting are Piper, Wolcott Wanderers, Blazing Bridles, Homestead, Nearman, and Prairie Fire.

4-H project meetings are not required to send the 4-H agent roll calls. (Examples include dog project trainings, shooting sports practices, horse project meetings, etc)



Officer Elections

The new 4-H year also means it's time to elect new youth club officers. Every 4-H Club should hold an annual election to vote in new officers to fill the roles of President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. If the club is large enough, additional youth officers may be elected including but not limited to: recreation leader, pledge/song leader, and reporter.

4-H members are encouraged to participate in officer roles for their club and practice valuable skills such as: leadership, responsibility, public speaking, parliamentary procedure, and communication. A 4-H leadership role looks great on resumes and job, scholarship, college, and trade school applications.

A brief summary of each role:

President- Lead the monthly club business meeting according to parliamentary procedure, encourage participation in the meeting, represent the club at events, attend as many 4-H club meetings as possible, set the rules of conduct, ensure the other officers are upholding their responsibilities, communicate with the adult club leaders.

Vice-President- Check with the president on plans or special work to be done, preside at the meeting or represent your group at other events in the president's absence, help plan club meetings and activities, work with the club at the beginning of the 4-H year to set goals for the club.

Secretary- Call roll and keep an accurate record of attendance, take meeting minutes- accurate notes of the events of each meeting and record motions, send meeting minutes to 4-H Agent.

Treasurer- Give the treasurer's report at each club meeting, be a signor on the club bank account, write checks for all expenditures (after receiving club approval), use the 4-H Treasurer's Record Book to keep club records, participate in the annual club financial review.

Recreation Leader- Prepare games/activities for each meeting and lead them, teach your fellow club members how to learn from teamwork activities.

Pledge and/or Song Leader- Lead the club in saying the 4-H motto and pledge, teach the club new songs, lead the group in singing at each meeting and, when requested, at special events.

Reporter- As a 4-H reporter, your job is to be a little nosey! Know what is going on in your club and tell your town about the good stuff. Spread the word about what your club is doing in the community.

Record Books Due November 1st

It's that time of year to start putting together your record books! We have many first timers that are eligible for the first year member pin, along with project award pins. 4-H Record Books are a great way to practice record keeping, written communication, and compile information for scholarships and college or job applications.

You can find information about record books and the pin award applications by going to the WyCo Extension website under the 4-H Youth Development tab, then go to Record Keeping on the left side of the screen. If you have questions about 4-H record books or need help putting yours together, call or email the 4-H agent! The <u>Kansas 4-H website</u> is also a great resource.

The deadline to submit your 4-H record book is Friday November 1
